
## PHRAGMIPEDIUM kovachii AND ITS INFLUENCE ON HYBRIDISING

#### A TALK GIVEN BY JOHN GAY

John explained that this talk had come a bit soon for his backroom staff who were on holiday and hadn't fine tuned his power point show and was heard to mutter "you just can't get the staff." That bit of fun aside it was a great talk with lots of pictures illustrating what he was talking about. This subject is obviously close to Johns heart and he is very comfortable and knowledgeable when talking about it . This came across as he spoke about the vagaries ,excitement, disappointment and sometimes skulduggery that happened as growers used this specie to create many hybrids. #### Trias dentifolia

This small genus of about10 epiphytic species comes from southeast Asia. It is closely related to bulbophyllum but has triangular flowers with fleshy spreading sepals that are much larger than the petals and lip. The anther cap is elongated and often cleft. The plants are small. With a creeping rhizome ,almost round single leafed pseudobulbs and solitary flowers, usually relatively large for the size of the plant. The inflorescences arise from the base of the pseudobulb. The name comes from the Greek trias, meaning three, referring to the triangular shape of the flowers



Paphiopedilum tonsum var cupreum

Paphiopedilum tonsum is endemic to north and west Sumatra (from Merek to Sidikalang road) between 900 and 1800 meters above sea level. It grows in leafy humus on the forest floor or in humus-filled cracks in limestone rocks and cliffs and sometimes near water seepages.

It is a small to medium sized, cool growing herbaceous humus epiphyte with oblong-elliptic, deep green mottled with gray green, up to 20 cm long, 5 cm wide leaves with purple undersides.

The Bald Paphiopedilum blooms in winter and the fall on an erect, terminal, 30 to 37.5 cm long, purple marked, single flowered inflorescence with an elliptic-lanceolate floral bract. The flower has a pinkish white

dorsal sepal veined green and dark purple. The outstretched petals are olive to pale yellow-green with darker green veins and may sometimes be flushed dull purple, with a few black warts in the inner surface. The lip is green to olive-brown with pink flushing and has darker brown or maroon veining.

### MEMBERS PLANT FOCUS





Bulbophyllum phalaenopsis is the largest of the Bulbophyllums, it is native to Irian Jaya. Mature plants can be very large. The basal inflorescences are 7 – 15cm long. Each produces 6-20 flowers. Individual flowers are 5 – 7cm long. The sepals are of a cup and lid form. The lateral sepals are fused and the dorsal sepal cups over them. The flowers are white or cream heavily spotted dark red-purple. Some are solid red-purple. A unique quality and the biggest draw to this unusual plant is that they STINK. Flowers will last 5-6 weeks or more. These prefer to be grown warm (perhaps intermediate) like Cattleya with stronger light.



I have grown this for nearly 5 years . Watered it regularly and fed it at the same time .It is right up in the light where the hottest part of the greenhouse is along with the Vandas. The Vandas have flowered regularly but not the bulbo. Then one day I sensed a smell . Unaware of what it was until halfway through watering it dawned on me

and when I lifted up the large leaf you can see ,there it was the most unusual bunch of flowers you could imagine , waiting for the flies to arrive. LOVELY! The leaf in the picture is one of many that you can't see and measure 1.2mts so its fairly long. The flowers lasted about 6 weeks.
